

Social report 2020





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Letter from the Chairman

The 2020 Social Report Fondazione Agnelli is presenting, today, to the world of Italian education and all of its stakeholders, unavoidably takes stock of the work we have carried out in a year that was incredibly difficult for all of us.

The bereavement and damages caused up until now by the SARS-CoV-2 pandemic – which is not over, despite the success of an extraordinary acceleration in vaccine science – mark a dramatic watershed in contemporary history. They will impact the way we live together, the economy and our vision of the future in ways we still need time to fully understand and consider.

School systems have also suffered, all over the world: the UN has warned of a worldwide "education catastrophe". And indeed, at a global level, we must all be aware that the future risks for this generation of students may be one of the worst prices we will have to pay due to the pandemic – worse than business losses and a decreasing GDP. I believe incisive actions are needed in Italy too, to reduce this impact.

Schools in our country, perhaps, have suffered more than those in other advanced nations. Here, the prolonged closures and recourse to remote learning began with lockdowns in the spring of 2020, and continued until the end of this past school year. We could see the damage this caused to students' social and emotional relationships early on. Now, we know it also caused relevant learning losses, which will make pursuing further education even harder for many boys and girls. Furthermore, all of this has exacerbated the weaknesses and inequalities that the national education system has struggled with for many years, far before the health emergency. We face a wide range of issues, and simplifying could be misleading.

Fondazione Agnelli's researches, however, point out that one of the first issues to tackle is teaching quality. Our teachers are well versed in their subjects, but often lack updated didactic resources –including digital tools, but not only – that would allow them to hold students' attention, stimulate their motivation to learn and

their ability to work independently, and help them uncover their talents and inclinations. Didactic innovation – first and foremost in crucial STEM subjects – is a need that school policies have neglected so far. The pandemic proved it to us, more clearly than ever. It is not by chance that teaching quality, innovation in didactics, initiatives to make school buildings safer, more sustainable, as well as more suitable for modern and engaging classes, are important elements in the Italian government's National Recovery and Resilience Plan. European funds are an opportunity that our school system cannot miss: while they are not sufficient to solve every problem, they can be decisive for Italian schools and universities to finally make the leap forward we have been waiting for in terms of quality.

In such a difficult year, Fondazione Agnelli never gave up. We continued to conduct researches and studies, always striving – beyond the health emergency – to consider the structural flaws of Italian education, making suggestions and recommendations for the public opinion and policymakers.

However, we also made a targeted effort to offer tangible initiatives. Amongst them, I would like to remember *Oltre le distanze*, which during lockdown helped approximately 45,000 teachers and educators provide adequate support to students with disabilities, even remotely. And *Arcipelago Educativo*, a project with Save the Children that allowed us – during the summer and the school year – to offer educational activities to around 2,200 disadvantaged students from various cities in Italy. Two examples, amongst the many, of how Fondazione Agnelli sought to continue its work with Italian schools, even during the pandemic.


